COORDINATED COMMUNITY RESPONSE TEAM, CCRT

A Coordinated Community Response Team (CCRT) joins community partners to provide inter-agency, coordinated responses to domestic violence, meet the needs of victims/survivors and more effectively holds offenders accountable.

Our CCRT meets monthly to discuss ways that will meet the needs of domestic violence survivors, and how it affects families in our parish. Members of organizations from across St. Bernard, such as the Community Center of St. Bernard, FINS, CASA, the SBPSB, SBPSO, District Attorney's office, Nunez Community College, and Ochsner/St. Bernard hospital, attend the meetings.

Representatives of the Louisiana Coalition Against Domestic Violence (LCADV) participate in the meetings and provide input on statewide issues and policy development to share with the team.

CCRT teams implement strategies to comprehensively help survivors. The teams work together to include items such as training and information sharing, community awareness and prevention campaigns, and case reviews. Teams can achieve their goals and assist survivors through an emphasis on the criminal justice system, victim services, prevention, and long-term assistance.

COMING SOON: DEANO CENTER

For almost 35 years, the St. Bernard Battered Women's Program, Inc. has empowered many survivors to live independent lives free from other individual's power and control.

Although providing a strong background for the survivors who have spent time with us, there is always time for changes-special changes.

As many of you know, we have changed our name to the Family Violence Program of St. Bernard (FVPSB). Along with our new name comes a new logo, new programs, new events, and more space to hold them.

We are excited to announce the opening of the "Deano Center" in memory of Ms. Thelma Deano, the inspiration and first Director of our program. Established in 1987 under the auspices of the St. Bernard Parish Sheriff's Office, we operated a residential and non-residential program from the old St. Bernard General Hospital across from the parish courthouse. It was leased to the Sheriff's Office for \$1 per year by Mr. Lynn Dean and his wife, Jackie. That's where it all began and operated until Hurricane Katrina swept through our parish, on August 29, 2005.

The new Deano Center, located at 9069 W. Judge Perez Dr. in Chalmette, is currently going through a make over, thanks to a generous donation from the Valero Foundation, and also volunteers from Valero, the United Way of Southeast Louisiana, and several contractors who have donated their time to help the progress move forward.

<u>BIP</u>: A Batterer's Intervention program which will work with the local court system, the district attorney's office, judges, and a mediator, to assist in creating a process of change for men who batter, will be held at the Deano Center using the Duluth Model.

HALL RENTAL: The Deano Center will be available for Hall Rental at a minimal cost. So start planning your up-coming meetings and small parties. Call 504-459-2657 for information.

Did You Know...Louisiana's rate of women murdered by men has increased for the sixth consecutive year? The Washington, D.C. based Violence Policy Center recently released its annual report on female murder victims. When Men Murder Women: An Analysis of Homicide Data. The report reviews female victims killed by male offenders in single victim/single offender incidents and ranks all states from highest to lowest. The 2019 report, which analyzes homicides committed in 2017, ranks Louisiana's rate of women murdered by men is more than twice the national average, at 2.64 homicides per 100,000 females.

INTERVENTION SERVICES: JOYCE WATSON, SUPERVISOR

Often we are asked, "How do you show up everyday to do this heartbreaking work?". "How do you continue to perform despite the challenges?" Our response is, the work is necessary and lifesaving. This is one example of why we keep doing this work.

At the time this survivor entered the FVPSB her abuser was stalking her. He put tracers on her vehicle and found her twice. We were able to have them removed and facilitate her transition from shelter into a housing program. Through a mutual friend, her abuser located her once more. Finally, she was able to get away and start over again, but that meant leaving the life she worked so hard to reestablish. Her road to a life free from violence has required her to relocate to another parish where the abuser could not locate her. She now has her own apartment and has enrolled in college. She is working towards a Paralegal degree that will not only afford her and her child independence, but also empower her to be able to help others.

She has had the tenacity to survive a horrific domestic violence situation that persisted for years despite her determination to escape. She has overcome so much in her life with perseverance and fortitude. In addition to other barriers, she faced drug addiction. She has made major strides in this area too and is now free from drugs. Unfortunately, in all the chaos, she found it necessary to give up her baby that she shares with the abuser to a relative to care for in order to keep the whole family safe. For now, she is doing all she can to create a loving, healthy home free of violence for her oldest child. She continues in our outreach program and the FVPSB is sponsoring her school efforts through the WISP program, which is helping to pay her school expenses. She is no longer a victim. She is a survivor. Single Mom. Employed. Thriving in college with a 4.0 average. She is prayerful that one day soon, she will be able to reunite with her child.

Yes, this work is challenging, sometimes overwhelming, but it makes it all worth it when you see survivors leave (escape) for the last time, gain self-sufficiency, acquire work, housing, personal transportation, and even further their education. We celebrate with them! We continue the work.
